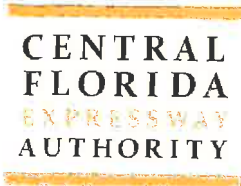

Plans for the new church and high school had been interrupted temporarily while CFX/OCX processed the original PD&E study. That original PD&E study, when approved, did not propose any impacts to the Diocese of Orlando’s property. Based on the approved alignment, Bishop Noonan advanced the Diocese’s plans by engaging an engineering firm to refine the master plan and engaging the an architectural firm to design the Phase I church building.
